A. The Five-year Re-screen Is Required for All Child Care Personnel. B. The Five-year Re-screen Must Include, at a Minimum, a Criminal Records Check (Both National and Statewide), a Sexual Predator and Sexual Offender Registry Search, and Child Abuse and Neglect History of Any State in Which an Individual Resided During the Preceding 5 Years.
