The Log Must Be Retained on File at the Facility for a Minimum of 12 Months and Available for Review by the Licensing Authority. The Log Must Include: 1. Each Child's Name, 2. The Date and Time of Departure, 3. Time of Arrival at the Destination, 4. The Signature of the Driver (Or in the Case of Travelling on Foot, the Signature of the Child Care Personnel), and 5. - **Areas of the Facility Were Found to Be in Need of Cleaning. CCF Handbook, Section 3.1, A Physical Environment [SR]**

Counselor Observed Paper on the Floor, Shelves Filled with Dust and Dirty, and Toys on the Floor. The Teacher Is Not Using a Clean Checklist. Counselor Give Technical Assistance to the Provider. 3 Physical Environment Children Are Much More Susceptible to the Adverse Effects of Environmental Factors, Materials and Toxicants. It Is Imperative That the Child Care Environment Is Conducive to the Healthy Development of Children. 3.1 General Health and Safety Requirements A. All Child Care Facilities Must Be Clean, in Good Repair, Free From Health and Safety Hazards and From Evidence Of, or Presence Of, Vermin Infestation. Indoor Play Areas Must Be Inspected Daily for Basic Health and Safety and Documented on a Daily Inspection Log. Outdoor Play Areas Must Be Inspected Daily for Basic Health and Safety. Any Problems Must Be Corrected Before the Play Area Is Used by Children. Counselor Will Reinspect the Facility on 4/12/24.
