Specialist Observed Children Sleeping on Mats That Were Less Than 18 Inches Apart. Teachers Moved the Children and Their Mats. The Child Care Facility Handbook States on Page 25: 3.6.2 Nap/Sleep Space C. A Minimum of 18 Inches Must Be Maintained Around Individual Napping and Sleeping Spaces. A Maximum of Two Sides of a Napping or Sleeping Space May Be Against a Solid Barrier, Such as the Wall. The Solid Side of a Crib Does Not Meet the Requirements for a Solid Barrier.

To Prevent Contact with Ready-to-eat Foods, Child Care Personnel Must Use Clean Disposable Gloves, Utensils, or Similar Items in the Food Preparation Area.

The Child Care Facility Handbook States on Page 61: 7.4.1 Background Screening Documents Background Screening Documentation Must Be Maintained for All Child Care Personnel as Defined by Section 402.302(3), F.S., Which Includes Household Members if the Facility Is Located in or Adjacent to the Home of the Operator. Background Screening Documentation Must Be On-site and Available for the Licensing Authority to Review.

Counselor Found Rust and Chipping Paint on the Playground Used for VPK Children. There Was Also a Crack in the Slide. the Child Care Handbook States: 3.1 General Health and Safety Requirements A. All Child Care Facilities Must Be Clean, in Good Repair, Free From Health and Safety Hazards and From Evidence Of, or Presence Of, Vermin Infestation. Indoor Play Areas Must Be Inspected Daily for Basic Health and Safety and Documented on a Daily Inspection Log. Outdoor Play Areas Must Be Inspected Daily for Basic Health and Safety. Any Problems Must Be Corrected Before the Play Area Is Used by Children. Documentation of the Indoor Play Area Inspection Must Be Maintained for 12 Months.

The Child Care Facility Handbook States: 4.7 Director Credential Section 402.305(2)(g), F.S., Requires a Child Care Facility to Have a Credentialed Director. Every Applicant for a License to Operate a Child Care Facility or a License for a Change of Ownership of a Child Care Facility Must Document That the Facility Director Has an Active Director Credential Prior to Issuance of the License.
